





Refugee Week

What is Refugee Week?

Refugee Week is a UK-wide programme of arts, cultural and educational events and activities that celebrate the contribution of refugees to the UK. It aims to promote a better understanding of why people seek sanctuary. It is usually celebrated around the 20th June each year. Anyone can be involved by organising, attending or taking part in activities.

What does being a refugee mean?

A refugee is someone who has had to leave their own country because they are being persecuted or are in fear of being persecuted. This means that they are afraid of being killed because of their religious beliefs, political opinions or their race. People are often forced to become a refugee due to war, political oppression or natural disasters.





Did you know?

Refugees often come from very different countries compared to the UK. They speak different languages, have a different culture, foods, traditions, religion, artistic and creative skills, and much more. We can learn a lot from people with different experiences to our own.

When did Refugee Week begin?

Refugee Week began in 1998 because there was a lot of incorrect information and ignorance about refugees. People read in the newspapers that refugees were here for financial benefits and 'free housing', and there was a lot of negative behaviour towards refugees.

Refugee Week organisers state:

"Our ultimate aim is to create better understanding between different communities and to encourage successful integration, enabling refugees to live in safety and continue making a valuable contribution"

What happens during Refugee Week?

Refugee Week is an exciting time of arts festivals, exhibitions, film screenings, theatre and dance performances, concerts, football tournaments and public talks. It is important that children are involved, as their opinion matters and they will make decisions about worldwide issues like refugees in the future. Schools are invited to have creative and educational experiences to gain more understanding of refugees in the world.

Israa is 13-years-old and is from Syria. She lives with her mum, dad and five younger brothers and sisters.

Israa and her family were forced to flee Syria in March 2011 after the civil war started there. It was too dangerous for them to stay. Israa says:

"Before the war started we spent our time playing outside the house but after is started we had to stay in all the time."

Despite everything, Israa still hopes to return to Syria in the future:

"When we return to Syria, we will live in a tent while we rebuild our house. We lost our house but we have our lives."



Israa helps her family by doing things like collecting water and doing the washing. She also draws and loves to read with her family.




Israa has five younger brothers and sisters. Before the war they lived normal lives, but when the fighting started, everything changed.

Questions About Refugee Week

Answers

1. Explain in your own words what you understand a refugee to be.

Own response - A refugee is a person who has had to leave their own country because they are in fear of their life. They are frightened that they might be killed because of their beliefs, race or religion, or because they are victims of a natural disaster.

2. Why was Refugee Week started?

Refugee Week was started because there was a lot of negativity about refugees and people in the UK thought they were just coming here for the financial benefits and housing.

3. Explain what 'sanctuary' means.

Sanctuary means a safe place or refuge.

4. What word tells us that people already living in the UK did not show refugees much understanding?

The word 'ignorance' tells us that people living in the UK did not show refugees much understanding.

5. What surprises you about the facts from the 2014 Refugee Week?

The organisers want to 'create better understanding between different communities and to encourage successful integration'.

7. How do you think refugees contribute to the UK? Explain your ideas.
