



Music for Home Learning



Here are some ideas for having fun whilst doing some musical activities at home. They are based on YouTube clips (so you may have to watch out for the adverts at the start). However, you may find other postings of the stories- or you may even have the books at home!

In each case, listen to or tell the story. Then read or watch the story again, looking for places where a sound effect could be added. You can choose as many or as few of these as you want. Then think about how you how you could make the sound effects. You could use voices, make noises using different parts of the body or use objects from around the house. You might even want to write down the part of the story where each sound goes and the sound you are going to make, creating a musical score!

Finally, watch or retell the story again, adding in the musical sound effects as you go.

If you want, why not try this for other stories too (or instead of the stories above)? Read a favourite story together (or find a version of it online) and create your own musical score before performing it together. You could even video the results. Or, if you want, you could even create your own story! Enjoy your music-making together!
